Dear Mayor Blevins and Council:

I am a member of the Pascagoula Quarterback Club and we are finalizing a number of ideas for the 2016 season to make games more exciting and draw more fans to the games. One of the ideas from last year, which we never pursued, was shooting a single firework when PHS scores. Other teams use cannons, sirens, fireworks, etc. to celebrate their team scoring and the firework idea actually came from the PHS C-Spire game in Pascagoula a couple of years ago when fireworks were launched from the youth league baseball fields.

I am attaching a copy of a safety and security plan I am submitting to Chief Carlson and Fire Inspector Troy Whitmore for approval. (The plan, as well as the type of fireworks proposed, will be modified if changes are requested by the fire department.) However, we also need the City's approval.

In that regard, I am requesting the City ordinance prohibiting fireworks within the City limits be waived for the following dates and times:

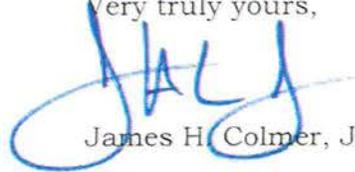

PHS FOOTBALL
FIREWORKS SAFETY & SECURITY PLAN

1. The fireworks are single shot Class C fireworks available for purchase by any of us, launched from a heavy plastic tube provided with the package of fireworks.
2. The proposed location is inside the youth (baseball) league gate on Tucker Street. According to Google Earth, that location is approximately 400 feet from the closest edge of the football stands, approximately 335 feet from the closest house to the east, and approximately 425 feet from the closest house to the north. The surface inside the gate is concrete.
3. The fireworks would be ignited using a standard long reach lighter.
4. The fireworks would remain in the packaging and only one (1) would be removed at a time so only one (1) would be at the location inside the youth league gate at any time. The package with the remainder of the fireworks would remain locked in my truck parked along the fence along Tucker Street.
5. A fire extinguisher approved by the fire department would be on hand in the event it were needed.
6. The heavy plastic tube from which the fireworks are shot would be screwed to either a 4 x 4 or 2 x 2 piece of plywood to prevent tipping over.
7. The single firework in the area inside the gate would never be left unattended. Selected adult members of the Quarterback Club, including myself, would be in charge of the fireworks.
8. No one will be inside the youth league gate with the exception of the selected adult member(s) of the Quarterback Club.
9. There will be no fireworks shot at half-time or at the end of the game, only a single shot when the football team scores.

- Out of town races will be charged for hotel lodging for All Timers

Generator:

- The Race is responsible for providing an electrical outlet with 110 Volt 20 Amp power hookup for the Inflatable Finish Line, Laptop and the Printer otherwise we can provide a 2000 Watt Generator for \$50 for half day, \$100 for all day event.

Live Mobile Results App:

- Our Mobile App lets the participants, fans and family members get their results on their smart phones within minutes of crossing the finish line. The cost for this service is \$100.

Results Kiosk with Label Printer:

- This set up consist of a 1 each Leaderboard Results Screen and several Laptops with a

19" Monitor, Keypad and a Label Printer. A Staff Member monitors the process where the participant can enter their bib # and receive a printout of their results on a 2-1/4" x 4" adhesive backing label for a keepsake. The cost for this service is \$100 per Kiosk setup (depending on the size of the event).

All Day Event Charge:

- All Day Events are custom quoted according to the requirements of the Event.

Fed Ex Charges

- The Race is responsible for all Fed Ex Charges involving the shipping of Race Bibs

4. Volunteers:

- The Race is responsible for providing 1-2 volunteers for Backup Timing depending on the size of the Event.

5. Race Bib Numbers

- Race Bibs must be provided by the Race and Race Director unless the Timer is notified at least 3 weeks prior to the Race to provide.
- The Race must send the Race Bibs to us at least 2-3 weeks prior to the Race to install the Disposable Chip Tags on the back and ship back before Packet Pickup.
- We do have Generic Race Bibs with Chip Tags attached as Emergency Backup just in case the Race Director runs out of Race Bibs the day of the Race or in the days leading up to the Race.
- There are several Race Bib distributors to contact as follows:
 1. Road ID does provide free Generic Race Bibs. We keep some in stock.

- Race Bibs **must** be worn in **front** and clearly visible when Participants go through the Finish Line for backup timing identification.
- When giving out Race Bibs please **remind Race Participants to not bend, fold or crumple Disposable Chip Tags** installed on the back of the Race Bib.
 - The Race Bibs with Chips cannot be covered by clothing. They must be loose against the body for optimal reads.
 - We do attempt to recycle all unused Race Bibs that are not handed out, so please turn in to us at the conclusion of your event.

6. Online Race Registration

- We do provide Online Race Registration through our Cajun Timing Website. If you choose to use Cajun Timing, we can assist in setting up your Online Registration Site.
- We are also capable of exporting from the Online Registration Websites (if given the necessary Log In information), assigning Bib Numbers and importing Participants directly into our Race Timing Software. We would then send a customized Alphabetical and Numerical Listing to the Race Director for Packet Pickup.

7. Participant Listing for Import

- If we do not perform the download then the Race is responsible for providing a listing of the Participant's necessary information in an Excel spreadsheet (we can email a Sample Spreadsheet) 5 days prior to Race Day in order to perform an import test and

8. Race Day Registration

- We do need to know how many to expect for Race Day Registration so that we can bring enough laptops for Race Day Data Entry. The Race is responsible for providing sufficient Data Input personnel.

- The Race Director **must not** start the race without the Official Timer at the Start.
- The “Gun Time” must be exact for Finish Times to be accurate.

- During the Race, we will post Unofficial Results on Wood Results Boards so that they can be reviewed by the Finishers for accuracy. All necessary corrections will be made at the Finish Line Tent.
- Official Printed Results will be given to the Race Director immediately after the Race so that Overall and Age Group Awards can be announced.
- Race Results will be emailed to the Race Director for posting on a website the same day as the Race Event. The Race Results can be sent in an Html and/or Pdf format. The Race Results will be posted on www.CajunTiming.com Results Page.

FACTS ABOUT ONLINE REGISTRATION

Some Questions and Answers concerning Online
Registration:

1. What is the cost for Online Registration?

There is no cost to the Race Director or Organization.

The cost is as follows for processing the registration and credit card payments. These fees are paid by the participant at the time of registering for the event. These fees are based on total checkout amount, not individual registrations. For example someone registering husband and wife for event and the cost is \$35 each; the total would be \$70 at checkout. The fee would be 6% of \$70 plus \$1. The total fee would be \$5.20 vs \$5.50 for 2 registrations. This helps when families are registering together.

2. How are payments for registration fees, donations, fundraising, e-commerce etc. paid to the Race Director or Organization?

Payments are paid directly to the Organization or Race Director by either a check, which is mailed, or by direct deposit into your checking account each Monday for the previous week of collected fees. You decide. **These payments are secure and are collected and paid out to you by our National Registration Partner, RunSignUp, LLC. We don't receive any of the entry fees that are paid thru online registration.**

3. Can we send each registered participant info about the race via emails?

Yes, you can send a broadcast email out to every registrant that registers and provides a valid email address at the time of registering.

4. Will I have complete control over my race regarding setup, manually entering paper applications, downloading etc.?

We have a mandatory question asking if they are a USAT Member, if they answer Yes, there is a box that pops up for their Membership Number and their membership is validated at that moment by USAT. If their membership will expire before your race date, they will be required to purchase either an annual renewal or a one day license at that time before they may proceed.

If they answer No, they will be required to do the same. The money paid for the renewal, one day license or a new membership is sent directly to USAT, you will not have to reconcile these payments. Also they will be signing the USAT Waiver directly with USAT.

This question becomes a column on your packet pickup listing along with a column that has the member USAT numbers and who paid the \$12 fee so you'll know who paid the fee and you can check the members numbers.

The next item for consideration was a request to approve the lease agreement between the City of Pascagoula and Pascagoula Main Street, Inc., for Arts on the Avenue located at 618 Delmas Avenue as recommended by Eddie Williams, City Attorney.

The lease agreement is spread on the minutes as follows:

**LEASE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF PASCAGOULA
AND PASCAGOULA MAIN STREET, INC.**

The City of Pascagoula is the owner in fee simple of certain real property located at 618 Delmas Avenue in the City of Pascagoula. Pascagoula Main Street, Inc. is a duly incorporated non-profit organization and, pursuant to Section 21-19-44.1 of the Mississippi Code of 1972 as annotated and amended, may receive from the City of Pascagoula certain donations of funds and in-kind services for the operation of the Main Street programs. Pascagoula Main Street, Inc. (Lessee) desires to lease the above-referenced property from the City of Pascagoula (Lessor) in accordance with the Memorandum of Understanding between the City of Pascagoula and Main Street which was executed on the 13th day of November, 2014, subject to the following terms and conditions:

1. **Premises.** Lessor does hereby agree to lease to Lessee the building located at 618 Delmas Avenue in the City of Pascagoula and which presently houses the Arts on the Avenue business that was previously established and operated by the Lessor.
2. **Terms.** The term of this lease shall be for a period of one (1) year beginning with the date of execution by the parties which shall be determined as being the date that the lease is officially signed by the authorized representative of the Lessor or August 1, 2016, whatever is later. This lease shall automatically renew on an annual basis under the same terms unless and until the same is terminated by written notice of termination executed and delivered by the terminating party to the non-terminating party on or before thirty (30) days prior to the anniversary date of the lease. Either party may terminate this lease, with or without cause, upon thirty (30) days written notice to the non-terminating party.
3. **Maintenance.** Lessor shall provide all maintenance for the premises to include the exterior of the structure, all heating and cooling equipment, plumbing and electrical utilities. To request performance of maintenance on any eligible defect or item of disrepair, Lessee must submit such request in writing to the Director of Community and Economic Development for the City. Lessor is not obligated to investigate or perform maintenance services without first receiving the request in writing from the Lessee. It shall be the duty of the Lessee to notify Lessor of any and all issues regarding maintenance of the premises and which are the responsibility of the Lessor. Lessor shall exercise due diligence to timely respond to eligible maintenance requests.

Lessor reserves the right to make the determination as to whether or not such maintenance request is caused from the results of normal wear and tear as opposed to any negligence or fault on the part of the Lessee, or Lessee's employees, agents or invitees.

Should Lessee, through its own negligence, or the negligence of any its agents, employees or invitees on the premises, cause damages thereto, then the repair of same shall be the responsibility of Lessee. Should Lessor have to perform repairs of such damage, then in such event, Lessee shall be charged for all expenses incurred by Lessor in making such repairs. Lessee shall have thirty (30) days from the date of invoice for such repairs within which to pay same. Failure to pay for the repair of damages within this period shall constitute a default hereunder. Delinquent amounts for such repairs shall be subject to an overdue charge of 15% of the amount of the invoice. Lessee shall be responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of any and all items placed on the premises by Lessee its agents, employees or invitees.

4. **Utilities.** Lessee shall be responsible for the payment of all utility services provided to the premises by Lessor. Lessee shall also be responsible for the payment of any deposits required by the Utility Department. Failure of Lessee to pay for utility services as and when the same become due and payable, shall constitute a default hereunder and may also result in the disconnection of utility services by the Lessor.
5. **Modifications.** Should Lessee desire to make any modifications to the interior of the premises, including painting, replacement of hardware and fixtures, installation of equipment or fixtures, movement of walls or erection of partitions of any kind, then in such event, Lessee shall provide Lessor with plans and specifications for such modifications and no such modifications will be allowed without the express written permission of the Lessor. Lessor agrees not to unreasonably withhold consent for such modifications. Under no circumstances, however, shall the Lessee be allowed to make modifications to the exterior of the premises.
6. **Insurance.** Lessor shall maintain insurance on the structure of the premises. Lessor assumes no liability or responsibility whatsoever for damage to any of Lessee's property, fixtures, equipment, or furniture on the premises. It shall be the responsibility of Lessee to procure whatever insurance Lessee deems appropriate to safeguard the contents of the premises. Lessee shall, however, purchase a premises liability policy in a face amount of not less than \$500,000.00 and shall name Lessor

as the first loss payee thereon. Lessee shall furnish to Lessor proof of this insurance coverage as of the date of the execution of this lease. Should Lessee at any time during the term of this lease fail to maintain such policy of insurance, then in such event, the same shall constitute a default hereunder and Lessor shall be allowed to re-enter and take possession of the premises as set forth hereinbelow.

7. **Assignability.** Lessee shall not undertake to assign this lease, or to sub-lease any portion of the demised premises, without the express written permission of the Lessor. Lessor agrees that it will not unreasonably withhold permission to allow such assignment or sub-lease.
8. **Illegal activity.** Lessee covenants and agrees that no illegal activity of any kind will be conducted on the premises or in any common areas that may be associated therewith. Lessee further covenants and agrees that the business activity contemplated by Lessee is in fact a legally sanctioned activity and that Lessee shall procure all permits necessary for the conduct of same. Lessee will make available to the Lessor copies of all such permits. Any failure to comply with the promises, representations and considerations made by Lessee in this paragraph shall constitute a default under this Lease.
9. **Force Majeure** – Should all or a portion of the demised premises be destroyed by an act of God, fire, vandalism or any calamity not directly attributable to the negligence or actions of either party to this lease, or to Lessee's invitees, agents, servants and employees, then in such event, this Lease shall be at an end and all obligations hereunder shall cease. Lessor reserves the right to make the final determination as to the habitability and suitability of the premises for continued occupancy by Lessee after the occurrence of such catastrophic event.
10. **Default.** Should Lessee breach any covenant or condition herein, the Lessor shall thereupon be entitled to the immediate re-entry into the premises and possession of all personal property remaining on the premises. Lessor may, either with or without notice, sell such personal property at private or public auction and apply the proceeds to the payment of all costs, attorney fees, damages, or any sum due to the Lessor by Lessee. The balance remaining, if any, shall be paid to Lessee. Should it become necessary for Lessor to retain legal counsel to assist in the enforcement of any of the terms and conditions of this Lease, and should Lessor prevail in such action, then Lessee shall be responsible for all attorney fees, court costs and expenses incurred by

Lessor in bringing and pursuing any action to enforce this lease, whether in a court of law, or by negotiation, without the necessity of filing suit.

11. **Arts on the Avenue.** Lessee acknowledges that the Lessor has heretofore operated a business known as "Arts on the Avenue" in the demised premises. Lessee, as part of the consideration for this lease, and in lieu of any payment of rent to Lessor for the use of the demised premises, agrees to assume full responsibility for the operation of the business known as Arts on the Avenue. By separate instrument, Lessor shall set-over and assign to Lessee all existing contracts with artists and Lessee shall become responsibility for the administration of those contracts. Lessee shall have the option of developing its own policies for the manner in which contracts will be made in the future with any artist or vendors on the premises. Lessee understands that the assignment of these contracts to Lessee shall be "without recourse" and that any and all funds generated thereby shall remain the sole and exclusive property of Lessee. Additionally, Lessor, by separate instrument, shall set-over and assign to Lessee, all items of personal property previously used by Lessor in the operation of the business known as Arts on the Avenue. This assignment shall likewise be without recourse and Lessee, upon receipt of possession of the items, shall assume all responsibility therefor, and the maintenance and upkeep, if any, associated therewith.

Lessor, for its part, agrees that Lessee shall have complete discretion in the operation of the business known as "Arts on the Avenue". Lessor asserts no control over the operation of the business and Lessee shall be allowed to make such changes as Lessee deems appropriate in the manner in which the business was previously operated by the Lessor. This will include, but is not limited to, a change of the name of the business, a change in hours of operation, changes in any and all policies affecting the operation of the business as heretofore established by the Lessor and such other changes as Lessee deems appropriate in the operation of the business.

12. **Miscellaneous.** The parties agree that this lease agreement is being made pursuant to a Memorandum of Understanding previously entered into by the parties on or about the 13th day of November, 2014. Should there be a conflict between any of the terms and conditions set forth in this lease with the terms and conditions set forth in the Memorandum of Understanding, the parties agree that the Memorandum of Understanding shall control. The parties further agree that this writing constitutes

the entire agreement of the parties and supersedes any prior agreements and communications either oral or in writing, pertinent to the lease of the demised premises. No modification hereof shall be allowed except in writing duly and properly executed by the parties. A waiver of the terms and conditions hereof by the Lessor shall not constitute a waiver of any other terms or conditions, nor shall it constitute a future waiver of any terms and conditions as set forth herein. The failure of Lessor to require performance of any provision of this lease, shall in no way affect the right of Lessor to require full performance in the future, or to resort to any remedy for enforcement at any time thereafter, nor shall the waiver by Lessor of a breach of the provisions of this lease be taken, or held to be, a waiver of any subsequent breach of such provision, unless specifically so stated in writing signed by the authorized representative of Lessor.

Lessor reserves the right, upon reasonable notice being given, to conduct periodic inspections of the premises to make certain that all utilities are functioning properly and that the premises are being used and kept in a safe and clean condition. Use of tobacco products on the premises, either inside or in the immediate vicinity of the premises is prohibited. The sale, consumption or use of alcohol is likewise prohibited on the premises unless expressly allowed by the Lessor after proper application being made by the Lessee. Lessee shall not permit or allow the entrance of domesticated or undomesticated animals onto the premises unless the same are qualified service animals.

13. **Notice.** Any notice to be given under this lease by Lessor to Lessee shall be considered as duly given if made in writing and left at the premises, or by certified mail to the following address:

The Mississippi Maritime Museum has submitted plans to renovate a portion of the Old Pascagoula High School. The building is situated within special flood hazard area and improvements are limited because the structure is below base flood elevation. Plans and associated costs to renovate the structure exceed the limits permitted by NFIP requirements. However, due to the historical nature of the property, variances can be considered.

The property was identified as a Mississippi Landmark on July 15, 1999, and added to the National Register of Historic Places on April 6, 2000. The proposed improvements have been approved by the Mississippi Department of Archives and History. In addition, support for the project has been provided by the Pascagoula Historic Preservation Commission.

Based on the nature of the improvements and the historic designation of the structures, I recommend that a variance be granted from the elevation requirements of the City's Flood Hazard Prevention Ordinance to allow the renovation of the property.

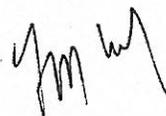
Please accept this letter as a variance request requiring compliance with the federal regulations of the National Flood Insurance Program due to the historical nature of this building.

Introduction

The National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) gives special consideration to the unique value of one of our Nation's most significant resources – its historic buildings, landmarks, and sites. It does so in two ways.

First, the NFIP floodplain management regulations provide significant relief to historic structures. Historic structures do not have to meet the floodplain management requirements of the program as long as they maintain their historic structure designation. They do not have to meet the new construction, substantial improvement, or substantial damage requirements of the program. This exclusion from these requirements serves as an incentive for property owners to maintain the historic character of the designated structure (44 CFR §60.3). It may also serve as an incentive for an owner to obtain historic designation of a structure.

Secondly, a designated historic structure can obtain the benefit of subsidized flood insurance through the NFIP even if it has been substantially improved or substantially damaged so long as the building maintains its historic designation. The amount of insurance premium charged the historic structure may be considerably less than what the NFIP would charge a new non-elevated structure built at the same level. Congress requires that the NFIP charge actuarial rates for all new construction and substantially improved structures (National Flood Insurance Act of 1968, 42 U.S.C. 4015).

Although the NFIP provides relief to historic structures from having to comply with NFIP floodplain management requirements for new construction, communities and owners of historic structures should give consideration to mitigation measures that can reduce the impacts of flooding on historic structures located in Special Flood Hazard Areas (44 CFR §60.3). Mitigation measures to minimize future flood damages should be considered when historic structures are rehabilitated or are repaired following a flood or other hazard event. Qualified professionals such as architects, historic architects, and engineers who have experience in flood mitigation techniques can help identify measures that can be taken to minimize the impacts of flooding on a historic structure while maintaining the structure's historic designation.

The purpose of this floodplain management bulletin is to explain how the NFIP defines historic structure and how it gives relief to historic structures from NFIP floodplain management requirements (44 CFR §60.3). This bulletin also provides guidance on mitigation measures that can be taken to minimize the devastating effects of flooding to historic structures.

Background on the NFIP

Congress created the NFIP in 1968 to provide federally supported flood insurance coverage, which generally was not available from private companies. The NFIP is based on a mutual agreement with communities that have been identified as having Special Flood Hazard Areas. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) will make flood insurance coverage available in a

The Old Pascagoula High School, 2903 Pascagoula Street, was listed on the National Register of Historic Places on April 6, 2000. At that time, four more modern buildings were not listed as they did not meet the age requirements. On July 25, 2012, three of these buildings, the Vocational Building (now part of the Bayside Village Apartment Complex), the Math & Science Building, and the Band Hall were listed. The fourth building, the Gym, was not listed as it had been altered. Designed by Claude Linsley, the three buildings listed were built in 1952, 1954, 1958, and were described, in the nomination, "as important Modern style public buildings in Pascagoula and Jackson County. The proximity of the 1939 building allows the viewer to compare popular ideas about how "modern" school building should appear over a relative short time span."

44 CFR 60.6 (a) states in part that "Variances may be granted for the repair or rehabilitation of historic structures upon a determination that the proposed repair or rehabilitation will not preclude the structure's continued designation as a historic structure and the variance is the minimum necessary to preserve the historic character and design of the structure." This has been interpreted as part of the NFIP floodplain management that 'historic structures' can be excluded from the NFIP elevation and flood proofing requirements. The City of Pascagoula is a signatory to the Programmatic Agreement covering this item.

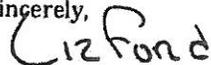
If the two buildings, the Band Hall, and the Math and Science Building, should be required to be elevated, it would aid in the destruction of the historical integrity of the buildings, as well as being totally out of character for the historic complex, as the other resources in the compound remain at their original elevation.

It is our recommendation that the variance be issued to preserve the integrity of the complex and the structures. The issuance of such variance would be in line with the intended purpose of 44 CFR 60.6 (a).

As the Band Hall and the Math and Science Building are listed on the National Register of Historic Places due to its inclusion in the Old Pascagoula High School Complex, this Commission request that the Owners of the property, the Mississippi Maritime Museum, adhere to the guidelines of the Secretary of the Interior and retain the historical integrity of the buildings in order not to be required to elevate same. This request is in line with paragraph two on the preceding page.

A copy of the National Register Nomination and the approval has been forwarded to you for your files.

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 2921, passed in the 2013 Regular Session of the Mississippi Legislature, authorized the City Council of the City of Pascagoula, Mississippi (City) to levy a tax not to exceed two percent (2%) upon the gross proceeds derived from sale of prepared foods by restaurants in the City, the proceeds of which tax are to be used for the purpose of implementing a comprehensive Parks & Recreation Master Plan which was adopted by the City on October 16, 2012; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 2921 was further extended by Senate Bill 2904, which was passed in the 2015 Regular Session of the Mississippi Legislature; and

WHEREAS, the Senate Bill provides that before the tax is imposed, there shall be held a referendum on the question of levying the tax, at which at least sixty percent (60%) of the qualified electors who vote in the referendum must vote in favor of the tax; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Senate Bill the City Council is required to adopt a resolution declaring its intention to levy the tax, setting forth the amount of the tax to be levied and the date such tax shall become effective, and calling for the question of levying the tax to be voted upon by the qualified electors of the City at an election to be held on the 30th day of August, 2016:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Pascagoula, Mississippi, as follows:

SECTION 1. That all recitations hereinabove are found and adjudicated to be true and correct.

SECTION 2. That the City Council intends to levy a tax of two percent (2%) upon the gross proceeds derived from the sale of prepared foods by restaurants in the City as defined within Senate Bills referred to hereinabove.

SECTION 3. That the City intends for the effective date of the levy of the tax to be 1st day of October, 2016.

SECTION 4. That a referendum shall be and is hereby ordered to be held within the City for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the City the proposition as set forth in the form of "Notice of Election" in Section 6 of this Resolution.

SECTION 5. That the proposition shall appear on the ballot for the election to be held on Tuesday, the 30th day of August, 2016, which shall be presented to the City's qualified electors at the polling places designated for municipal general elections. The polling places will be open from the hour of seven o'clock A.M. until the hour of seven o'clock P.M. on that date, and all qualified electors of the City shall be entitled to vote in the election.

SECTION 6. AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE A LEISURE AND RECREATION DISTRICT WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF PASCAGOULA; TO DESIGNATE THE GEOGRAPHIC PARAMETERS OF THE DISTRICT; TO PROVIDE A MAP THEREOF; TO PROVIDE FOR OUTSIDE CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES WITHIN THE DISTRICT; TO PROVIDE AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND, FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PASCAGOULA, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Creation and designation of Leisure and Recreation District.

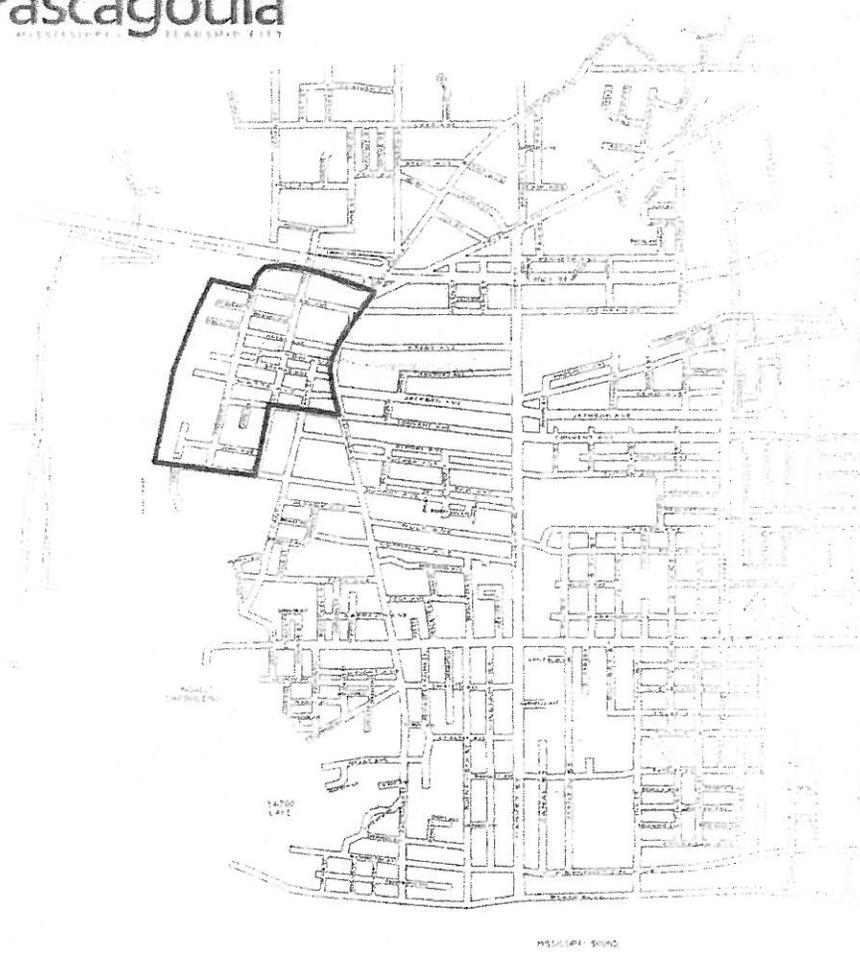
- (a) Pursuant to the authority granted in Section 1 of House Bill 1223, 2016 Regular Session of the Mississippi Legislature, there is hereby created a "Leisure and Recreation District (District)", within the corporate limits of the City of Pascagoula.
- (b) The aforesaid District shall be known as the "Downtown Social District" and shall be further defined by a line running as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the west margin of Pascagoula Street with the north margin of Convent Avenue as the Point of Beginning of the Downtown Social District; thence northerly along the west margin of Pascagoula Street to its intersection with the north margin of Cypress Avenue; thence westerly along the north margin of Cypress Avenue to its intersection with the west margin of Frederic Street; thence south and along the west margin of Frederic Street to its intersection with the north margin of Live Oak Avenue; thence west along the north margin of Live Oak Avenue and an extension thereof to a point on the east bank of the east prong of the Pascagoula River; thence southerly and along the east bank of the east prong of the Pascagoula River to a point lying on an extension of the north margin of Dupont Avenue that is due west of the intersection of the north margin of Dupont Avenue with the west margin of Magnolia Street; thence east along the aforesaid extension of the north margin of Dupont Avenue and the actual north margin thereof to its point of intersection with the west margin of Magnolia Street; thence north along the west margin of Magnolia Street to its intersection with the north margin of Convent Avenue; thence east along the north margin of Convent Avenue to the Point of Beginning.

(c) The newly created District is geographically represented by the map set forth hereinbelow.

(d) Any on-premise retail alcoholic beverage permittee (hereinafter "permittee") located within the above described District shall comply with all laws, rules and regulations, which govern its license type, except that a patron, guest or member of the licensee may remove an open container of alcoholic beverage and wine from the licensed premises and may possess and consume the alcoholic beverage and wine outside of a licensed premises anywhere within the boundaries of the District subject to the following regulations:

- (1) A person may not enter a licensed premise with an alcoholic beverage, whether acquired at that licensed premise, or elsewhere.
- (2) A permittee located in the District shall allow alcoholic beverages to be removed from the licensed premises only in a paper or plastic cup, not larger than 16 fluid ounces in size, and no such alcoholic beverages shall be removed from the licensed premises in a can, bottle, glass container or other container, except as otherwise allowed by law.
- (3) No permittee shall allow a patron, guest or member to exit its licensed premises with more than one open container of alcoholic beverages, and it shall be unlawful for any person to exit such licensed premises with more than one open container of alcoholic beverages.
- (4) Permittees located in the District shall post, at all points of egress from the licensed premises, a map of the boundaries of the District in which it is located. This map shall be provided, either in electronic or paper form, to the permittees by the City upon request of the permittees.
- (5) Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to require a permittee located in the District to allow its patrons to remove alcoholic beverages or wine, in open containers, from the licensed premises.
- (6) Enforcement of the boundaries of the District shall be the responsibility of the Pascagoula Police Department. In addition, the Police and Fire Departments shall

provide public safety services within the District in the same manner as provided in the remainder of the City.

(7) For purposes of this ordinance, the term "alcoholic beverages" shall mean any alcoholic liquid, including wines of more than 5 percent of alcohol by weight, capable of being consumed as a beverage by a human being, but shall not include light wine and beer, as defined in Section 67-3-3, of the Mississippi Code of 1972 and shall also include native wines.

(8) All ordinances or any parts thereof in conflict with this ordinance are hereby declared to be inapplicable within the geographic boundaries of the District.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall become effective as provided by law.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall not be codified.

RESOLUTION PROVIDING PRELIMINARY APPROVAL FOR TAX ABATEMENT REQUEST BY BRADY'S STEAKS AND SEAFOOD

WHEREAS, Section 17-21-5 of the Mississippi Code of 1972 authorizes Municipal Governing Authorities, in their discretion, to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxation, except ad valorem taxation for school district purposes, for new structures, or improvements to or renovations of existing structures located in the designated Central Business District of the municipality, for a period of not more than seven years from the date of completion of the new structure or the improvement to or renovation of the existing structure for which the exemption is granted; and

WHEREAS, the City Council, on or about January 18, 2011, established a policy for the granting of such exemptions; and

WHEREAS, Brady Steaks and Seafood, has now made application to the City Council for preliminary approval of an abatement request for construction improvements on certain property in the Central Business District that are expected to equal or exceed \$800,000 in value; and

WHEREAS, Brady Steaks and Seafood, has likewise applied for a building permit for the purpose of constructing a restaurant at the location on 3801 Magnolia Street in the Central Business District of the City of Pascagoula; and

WHEREAS, the application for the abatement is attached hereto as Exhibit A and the construction permit is attached hereto as Exhibit B; and

WHEREAS, the Planning and Building Department of the City of Pascagoula, which is responsible for the oversight of the construction of this project, has recommended to the

Council that a preliminary approval of the tax abatement request be granted:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PASCAGOULA AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. All of the statements made in the foregoing preambles are incorporated herein and found to be factual.

SECTION 2. The request of Brady Steaks and Seafood, for preliminary approval of a tax abatement on the “Brady Steaks and Seafood Project” is hereby granted.

SECTION 3. This preliminary approval shall be for a tax abatement for a period of seven (7) years and 80% of the value of the improvements to the Applicant’s property.

SECTION 4. Final approval of this exemption request will be contingent upon the successful completion of the project by the Applicant in accordance with the directives of the Planning and Building Department of the City of Pascagoula and in strict conformance with the policy guidelines adopted by this Council on January 18, 2011.

SECTION 5. Final approval of this abatement request shall not be granted under any circumstances until such time as all construction activity has been completed to the satisfaction of the Planning and Building Department of the City of Pascagoula and a certificate of occupancy has been issued.

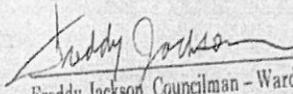

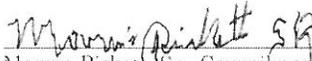

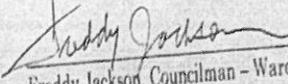

MEETING JUNE 1, 2016

Mike McElhaney opened the meeting at 6:00 pm. He welcomed guests Steve Jordan, Dr. Randy Roth, Noah Hamilton, and Brian Hinkle to the meeting. Mike also congratulated Johnny Olsen on his appointment as Head Coach for Resurrection Catholic School's Baseball Team.

Paul Hembree made the motion to approve the May 4, 2016 minutes as presented. Jay Spradlin seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

MCC Park – Resurrection Eagles: Brian Hinkle introduced the idea for RCS to make improvements at MCC Park for Girls High School Softball and Boys High School and Middle School Baseball. He presented the Commission with a handout of a presentation of his talking points (attached). He concluded that RCS would like to make MCC their home field and see how a partnership with the City to make improvements could work.

Steve Jordan presented a sketch of the fields and a spreadsheet of the phases they would like to complete with budget numbers. The priorities are:

Phase I=\$72,300: Installing new fences to rearrange the fields to have a 200' softball field and a 310' baseball field. They would do so by utilizing the outfield fence of the West field and moving home plate. They would also use the current fence lines for the boys field but move home plate back toward the backstop and install a new 8' wooden outfield fence. They would tear down the backstops and install a knee wall and net. They would also like to install new dugouts. New irrigation would be installed and they would like to sprig the outfields with a hybrid Bermuda grass. They would also like to remove the basketball court and suggested the City move it to IG Levy Park.

Phase II: Construction a dressing room, coach's office and hitting facility.

Phase III: Fan seating and scoreboards.

They asked if Darcie could contact the Planning and Building Dept. about the base flood elevation requirements at this location. She will do so.

Lewis Sims made a motion to make a recommendation to City Council to match up to \$25,000 to match funds raised by RCS for the materials needed for Phase I of the project, as it falls with the recreation plan (with RCS providing all of the labor). Paul Hembree seconded the motion. After discussion Mr. Sims amended his motion to match dollar for dollar of the school's fundraising for this project up to \$35,000. The vote passed unanimously.

Darcie will prepare and agenda item for the City Council to consider at the June 21, 2016 meeting.

Old Business:

Hotel Tax: The hotel tax information was presented. \$1,395,448.18 has been collected since collections started in 2005. The total amount remaining after projects have been completed is \$574,380.45. The receipts collected in May 2016 were \$20,255.18

Recreation Improvements Update: Jay Spradlin provided an update. The committee met on 5/31/16. Jay stated that there has not been much communication with the school district due to their strategic planning efforts coming this fall. Jay stated that Geoff Clemens and Jon Reynolds are working on renderings to give to City Council with a task order for the June 21, 2016 meeting.

Project Update: Darcie gave the Commission an update on the Point channel dredging. There is an additional section of dredging that leads to the Pascagoula River Channel. The change order was presented to the Jackson County Board of Supervisors in May and agreed upon by the City Council. Work should be done in the coming months.

A scope of work has been created for the ADA restroom renovations at MCC Park. Quotes are being received. This work should be done this summer.

BB Jennings Boardwalk project: the property line concern is resolved and design is moving forward. We expect to have this project underway this year.

The Beach Promenade project bids were awarded by City Council, contingent upon outside agency approval. We expect this project to start in June.

New Business:

USA Head's Up Football: Lewis Sims attended a state coach's meeting in April where they discussed the Head's Up Initiative by USA Football where youth and

school coaches can receive on-line training for proper tackling techniques and concussion training. Lewis will send Darcie the information to get to the Jackson County Football League. Al Brimm asked Lewis is he would be willing to work with the coaches. He said yes.

Darcie will put this back on the agenda for July. Lewis will bring information for the Commission.

**RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE SUBMISSION OF THE
FY2016 ACTION PLAN APPLICATION**

WHEREAS, the City of Pascagoula is an “Entitlement City” under the terms of the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG) program; and

WHEREAS, the Regulations of the CDBG program require the preparation and adoption of a Five-Year Consolidated Plan for Housing and Community Development and a One-Year Action Plan which serves as the annual application for CDBG Entitlement funds allocation; and

WHEREAS, the City will adopt a One-Year Action Plan component for the 2016 CDBG Program Year, which was prepared in accordance with rules and regulations governing the Consolidated Plan; and

WHEREAS, the said One-Year Action Plan for CDBG Program Year 2016 included, among other things, the anticipated use of the City’s 2016 Program Year Entitlement estimated at \$179,527 and the reallocation of \$13,975;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PASCAGOULA THAT:

Section One: The findings, conclusions, statements of fact contained in the preamble are adopted and ratified.

Section Two: Harry J. Blevins, Mayor of the City of Pascagoula, be and is hereby authorized to sign the required HUD certifications and submit 2016 One-Year Action Plan to HUD for HUD review and approval.

CERTIFICATIONS

In accordance with the applicable statutes and the regulations governing the consolidated plan regulations, the jurisdiction certifies the following:

Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing. The jurisdiction will affirmatively further fair housing, which means that it will conduct an analysis to identify impediments to fair housing choice within the jurisdiction, take appropriate actions to overcome the effects of any impediments identified through that analysis, and maintain records reflecting the analysis and actions in this regard.

Anti-Displacement And Relocation Plan. The jurisdiction will comply with the acquisition and relocation requirements of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, as amended, and implementing regulations at 49 CFR 24; the jurisdiction has in effect and is following a residential anti-displacement and relocation assistance plan required under section 104(d) of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, in connection with any activity assisted with funding under the CDBG or HOME programs.

Drug-free workplace. It will continue to provide a drug-free workplace by:

1. Publishing a statement notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in the grantee's workplace and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violation of such prohibition;
2. Establishing an on-going drug-free awareness program to inform employees about:
 - o The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
 - o The grantee's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace;
 - o Any available drug counseling, rehabilitation, and employee assistance programs; and
 - o The penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug abuse violations occurring in the workplace;
3. Making it a requirement that each employee to be engaged in the performance of the grant be given a copy of the statement required by paragraph 1;
4. Notifying the employee in the statement required by paragraph 1 that, as a condition of employment under the grant, the employee will:
 - o Abide by the terms of the statement; and
 - o Notify the employer in writing of his or her conviction for a violation of a criminal drug statute occurring in the workplace no later than five calendar days after such conviction;
5. Notifying the agency in writing, within ten calendar days after receiving notice under subparagraph 4 from an employee or otherwise receiving actual notice of such conviction. Executive Summary

1. Introduction

The City of Pascagoula's 2016 One-Year Action Plan is a component of its 2015-2019 Five-Year Consolidated Plan and serves as the City's application to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for entitlement grants. For Program Year 2016, which begins October 1, 2016, and ends September 30, 2017, the City of Pascagoula (the City) was allocated \$179,527 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds from HUD; it does not anticipate receiving any CDBG Program Income in the 2016 Program Year.

The City is not a formula entitlement recipient under HUD's Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG), Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA) or HOME Programs. This Action Plan identifies the City of Pascagoula's sources of Program Year 2016 funds and other resources available to plan and implement specific activities that are intended to primarily benefit low- to moderate-income residents by meeting their housing and nonhousing community development needs.

Through its citizen-based public planning process described in this Action Plan and the City's 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan, the community's housing and nonhousing community development needs and priorities were identified. Input provided by citizens, citizen groups and nonprofit organizations, in particular those agencies structured to deliver housing and supportive services to Pascagoula's low- and moderate-income residents, assisted the City in identifying community priorities that focus on: 1) improving the quality of life for residents, especially in areas where the majority of households qualify as low- to moderate-income; and 2) expanding public services for very low, low and moderate-income families, the homeless and qualified residents with special needs, such as the elderly, persons experiencing domestic violence, and disabled persons.

2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan

As identified in its 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan, the City's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Entitlement Program is guided by the overarching goal of developing a viable community in which all residents, but especially those in low- to moderate-income households and those who have special needs, enjoy:

- decent housing;
- suitable living environments; and
- economic opportunities.

The City will continue to address its unmet housing and nonhousing community development needs by: supporting improved access to affordable housing; providing housing assistance services; implementing activities to provide suitable living environments; and addressing unmet needs of the homeless and special needs populations through funded qualified public services. Working collaboratively with public and private agencies, organizations, community leaders, residents and other interested parties, the City strives to accomplish this goal by achieving objectives identified and prioritized as part of the annual CDBG Action Plan development process. Each One-Year Action Plan supplements information and citizen input detailed in the current Five-Year Consolidated Plan.

The City adhered to its citizen participation plan during development of the 2016 Action Plan to encourage and consider citizen input, as detailed in Section AP-12. Community priorities and unmet needs identified during development of the 2016 Action Plan supplement those identified in the City's 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan and guided identification of proposed CDBG-funded activities. The City's ability to comprehensively address its unmet community needs, which are considerable, is constrained by the limited amount of CDBG resources annually allocated to it by HUD. Every effort is made to maximize public benefits by leveraging other funding resources. By investing CDBG funds at the neighborhood and individual household level, the City improves the quality of life for the greatest possible number of residents, particularly for those who reside in low- to moderate-income households, the homeless, and those who have special needs.

Activities identified for implementation in Pascagoula's 2016 Action Plan are intended to principally benefit low- to moderate-income residents by funding neighborhood improvement activities that improve the living environment in primarily residential areas in which the majority of households qualify as low- to moderate-income. These activities also will stimulate neighborhood revitalization by encouraging individual residents to maintain and improve their property in compliance with local code requirements. The outcomes of this effort will be improved housing conditions and healthier, safer living environments.

3. Evaluation of past performance

This is an evaluation of past performance that helped lead the grantee to choose its goals or projects.

The City monitors its performance in terms of meeting HUD national objectives; spending CDBG funds on a timely basis; meeting identified goals with CDBG funds; and complying with HUD regulations and policies on an on-going basis through IDIS software tools, monthly reports and staff interaction.

The City also assesses its performance at least once annually and conducts a public hearing to inform the public of its progress in completing activities funded through the CDBG Program. The City reports past performance to HUD annually through its Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER).

4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

The City of Pascagoula encourages citizen participation throughout development of each One-Year Action Plan, including this 2016 One-Year Action Plan, in compliance with its Citizen Participation Plan, which identifies the specific process the City follows to invite residents and other interested parties to participate in identifying and prioritizing community needs and to provide input into the use of Community Development Block Grant funds to address those needs. The City also consulted with regional housing and nonhousing community agencies and nonprofits, including the Mississippi Regional Housing Authority VIII, the Open Doors Homeless Coalition Continuum of Care, and the Gulf Coast Center for NonViolence, in developing the 2016 Action Plan.

Section AP-12 details the specific steps the City took to comply with the intent and requirements of its Citizen Participation Plan to encourage broad input into development of the 2016 Action Plan. This included publishing and posting notices, contacting individual nonprofit agencies and organizations to encourage their participation, and using social media to expand outreach to residents.

A public hearing was held at 5:30 p.m. on June 20, 2016 in the Council Chambers of Pascagoula City Hall, which is accessible to persons with disabilities; meeting notices provided information about how to request accommodations such as a translator or signing assistance. A 30-day comment period, June 27 – July 29, 2016, was publicized to encourage public review of the Draft Action Plan and invite public input into the development process. The Pascagoula 2016 Action Plan was submitted for consideration of adoption by the City Council at its regular meeting on August 2, 2016, and was submitted to HUD via IDIS before August 15, 2016.

5. Summary of public comments

A public hearing to discuss the City of Pascagoula’s 2016 One-Year Action Plan was held on Monday, June 20, 2016 at 5:30 p.m. in the Council Chambers of Pascagoula City Hall. Minutes from the meeting,

All oral and written comments formally submitted during the public hearing and during the 30-day comment period were considered by the City and are summarized in the final 2016 Action Plan. Lack of funding to address all identified needs requires the City to prioritize use of limited CDBG funds to maximize benefits for the greatest number of low- to moderate-income residents possible.

7. Summary

In Program Year 2016, the City received a HUD allocation of \$179,527 in CDBG Entitlement funds to assist the City in addressing some of the unmet housing and nonhousing community development needs identified through its citizen participation process. To the extent possible, the City leverages these CDBG funds to maximize public benefit to improve residents' quality of life, particularly for those who reside in low- to moderate-income households, who are homeless or who have special needs.

The City will continue to work actively with local, regional and state nonprofit agencies and service providers that serve its low- to moderate-income residents, the homeless and those with special needs by supporting their applications for federal and state assistance when the programs proposed to be funded are consistent with Pascagoula's 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan and the 2016 Action Plan.

Proposed activities and use of funds in the 2016 One-Year Action Plan are based on achieving community goals and priorities identified in the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan.

The City actively works to enhance coordination and collaboration between the regional housing authority and regional and local housing and community development service providers. Regular communication among the City, the Regional Housing Authority VIII and local and regional housing and social service agencies minimizes duplication of efforts; maximizes effective use of limited resources; improves efficient delivery of services and management of client data; and encourages consideration of collaborative community-wide solutions to better meet residents’ housing and nonhousing needs.

On an on-going basis, the City of Pascagoula:

- Encourages coordination and communication between public and private sector agencies in the City’s institutional structure to minimize duplication of efforts.
- Supports the efforts of the Regional Housing Authority VIII and other organizations to meet the housing needs of the elderly and others with special needs with HUD program funding and other public and private resources.
- Supports the efforts of the social service agencies in the City of Pascagoula, Mississippi to address the full Continuum of Care.
- Encourages and considers citizen input regarding the use of HUD resources, in compliance with its citizen participation plan.
- Supports efforts to improve delivery methods and institute systematic improvements of the Salvation Army, South Mississippi AIDS Task Force, Homes of Grace, Open Doors Homeless Coalition, Gulf Coast Center For NonViolence, Boys and Girls Clubs, Public Housing Resident Councils, Stevens Center and other nonprofit agencies to meet the housing and nonhousing needs of the homeless, the elderly, the physically and mentally disabled, persons living with HIV/AIDS and their families, and individuals with drug and alcohol addiction who reside in the City of Pascagoula.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

The City has a good working relationship with the Open Doors Homeless Coalition Continuum of Care and is an active participant in the multi-county, multi-agency effort to address the full continuum of care for the homeless on the Mississippi Gulf Coast.

While Pascagoula is not a formula entitlement recipient under HUD's Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG), Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA) or HOME Programs, its partnership with the local continuum of care, the Open Doors Homeless Coalition, allows it to keep abreast of the needs of the homeless and chronically homeless populations in the City as well as with those at risk of becoming homeless.

In addition, the City also maintains a good working relationship with experienced housing service providers and supports their efforts to address emergency, transitional and permanent housing needs by investing CDBG funds in eligible public service activities that benefit chronically homeless individuals and their families, families with children, veterans, unaccompanied youth and persons at risk of homelessness.

In its 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan, the City identified the need for additional emergency shelters, transitional housing units and permanent, affordable housing units. To address this priority need, the City will continue to:

- support applications for funding from local and regional homeless and housing services providers;
- work with local and regional partners to identify and secure other resources needed to fully address the needs of the homeless; and
- support other public agencies in their efforts to develop education and employment training programs for the homeless.

In its 2016 Action Plan, the City budgeted CDBG resources to develop a Comprehensive Neighborhood Revitalization Strategy to improve its capacity to plan and manage housing programs and activities. The strategy will be a blueprint to guide City efforts to meet the varied housing needs of Pascagoula citizens.

Specifically, the strategy will identify eligible funding sources, application requirements and management recommendations to leverage funds from federal and state sources to maximize efficient coordination and implementation of multiple housing programs that will address residents' short- and long-term affordable housing needs.

The City also considered the 2016 Mississippi Annual Action Plan, made available in draft form in March 2016.

1. Summary of citizen participation process/Efforts made to broaden citizen participation Summarize citizen participation process and how it impacted goal-setting

The City encouraged citizen participation throughout development of its 2016 Action Plan, in compliance with its Citizen Participation Plan. To encourage input from citizens, particularly low, very low and extremely low income persons, information about the 2016 Action Plan development process and availability of the draft was posted at City Hall, at the Community and Economic Development Department, in the Pascagoula Library and at public housing complexes; notices were published in the daily newspaper and posted on the City's website and on Facebook. The housing and social service agencies that provide direct services to low, very low, and extremely low income persons, the homeless and those with special needs were emailed the 2016 Action Plan development schedule and encouraged to share it with their clients.

A copy of all published notices is attached to this document. Specific steps taken by the City to broaden community input into development of the 2016 Action Plan include:

- Publishing a Notice of Availability of Information as it pertains to the City of Pascagoula's 2016 One-Year Action Plan and any Amendments, if applicable, to the prior program year funding.
- Emailing letters to housing and social service agencies, and civic organizations to encourage attendance at the public hearing and to make them aware of the availability of information regarding the 2016 One-Year Action Plan;
- Publishing a Notice of Public Hearing in the local paper, *The Sun Herald*, to invite the public to attend and provide input into development of the 2016 One-Year Action Plan.
- Posting notices regarding the public hearing and availability of information about the 2016 One-Year Action Plan on the City's website, as well as at City Hall, and the Pascagoula Library.
- On June 20, 2016, conducting a public hearing to provide citizens with an opportunity to comment orally and in writing about the housing and non-housing community development needs of the City and about the proposed use of CDBG funds during the 2016 Program Year;

The City of Pascagoula has not budgeted CDBG or other funds to provide affordable housing during Program Year 2016 as it does not receive HOME, ESG or HOPWA funding.

As stated in its 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan, the City will continue to assist homeless persons with emergency and transitional housing and related services by allocating a portion of its annual CDBG allocation to nonprofit agencies that provide CDBG-eligible public service activities.

Introduction

As part of the 2016 Action Plan development process, the City of Pascagoula considered all citizen input in terms of identifying and addressing unmet community development needs to achieve the goals identified in its Consolidated Plan with available CDBG resources.

A portion of each year's annual CDBG allocation is budgeted by the City for program administration to pay some of the costs associated with implementing the Entitlement Program, including publication fees for CDBG-related notices and educational outreach that addresses fair housing and payday lending businesses. In Program Year 2016, \$10,000 is budgeted for CDBG administration activities.

The City is in the process of amending its 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan to include housing and nonhousing community development goals and community priorities that more comprehensively reflect Pascagoula's unmet needs. These goals and priorities were identified through the citizen participation process during development of the Consolidated Plan, 2015 Action Plan and 2016 Action Plan, but were not specifically identified. Consequently, the IDIS templates for the 2016 Action Plan do not identify all of the City's goals and priorities, as indicated by the sentence "No Projects have been added to this Annual Action Plan" in the Projects chart that immediately follows this narrative.

Projects for which 2016 CDBG funds are budgeted are:

- Neighborhood Revitalization Strategy \$25,000 to address the need for housing capacity building; assumed to benefit low/mod households per Sec. 570.200(a)
- Commercial Sign Removal Matching Grant Program \$30,000 to address nonhousing community development needs for improved living environment and revitalization of low/mod neighborhoods; an estimated 400 households will benefit
- Gateway Neighborhood Rebuilding & Revitalization Project \$40,000 to address public facilities and improvements other than housing; an estimated 250 households will benefit
- ADA Public Access Improvements \$62,502 to correct physical defects and make ADA enhancements in locations to be determined based on priorities identified in the Pascagoula ADA Self-Evaluation and Transition Plan; citywide benefit
- Public service activities to provide emergency and transitional housing to address or prevent homelessness; \$6,500 each to Open Doors Homeless Coalition, Gulf Coast Center for NonViolence and Rock Community Outreach Services; 53 households estimated to benefit
- Public service activity to provide transportation services for elderly residents to healthcare appointments in Pascagoula \$6,500; estimated to benefit 887 persons

Describe the reasons for allocation priorities and any obstacles to addressing underserved needs

To meet underserved and unmet needs identified during development of the 2016 Action Plan and 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan, the City has allocated \$26,000 in PY2016 CDBG funds for public service activities. This level of support for public service activities funding complies with HUD’s annual public services category cap.

The allocation of funds for eligible public service activities was determined by the City based on information provided in written requests submitted by nonprofit agencies and consideration of applicants’ past performance, professional capacity to provide the identified service, fiscal management experience, and program delivery achievements as they pertain to providing services to the homeless or to other special needs populations in the City. The City also considered community goals and priorities identified in the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan and the 2015 Action Plan in allocating its Program Year 2016 CDBG funds.

Other Program Year 2016 activities funded with CDBG resources were identified during the citizen participation process for development of the 2016 Action Plan and 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan and support Pascagoula’s overarching goal of developing a viable community in which all residents, but especially those in low- to moderate-income households and those who have special needs, enjoy:

- decent housing;
- suitable living environments; and
- expanded economic opportunities.

As identified in its 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan, the primary obstacle to addressing underserved needs in Pascagoula continues to be the lack of federal, state, and local resources - including CDBG Entitlement funds - to meet the high level of underserved needs in the community.

Introduction

Providing a suitable living environment for its residents, especially those in low- to moderate-income households and special needs populations, is a primary goal of the City of Pascagoula, which it attempts to address through its limited CDBG annual allocation. The City does not receive HOME, ESG, or HOPWA funding.

In 2016, the City has budgeted a portion of its limited CDBG allocation to fund public service activities to help it achieve its annual goal of supporting affordable housing assistance for 17 homeless households and 36 nonhomeless households. This goal will be achieved through CDBG-funded public service activities conducted by the Open Doors Homeless Coalition and the Gulf Coast Center for NonViolence to support homeless households. Another 2016 CDBG-funded affordable housing public service activity, conducted by Rock Community Outreach Services, will provide rental and utility assistance to 36 low- to moderate-income households.

Discussion

AP-60 Public Housing – 91.220(h)

Introduction

The Mississippi Regional Housing Authority VIII is the local public housing agency in the City and administers both the public housing and Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program. Not only is it not identified as “troubled,” the Mississippi Regional Housing Authority VIII is considered a “High Performing Public Housing Authority” that serves a variety of tenants including the elderly, disabled, veteran, and family populations.

Of the 21 projects that the housing authority owns and manages, three are located in the City and include a total of 198 units. The Housing Authority also administers 6,778 Section 8 housing vouchers, but it is not possible to identify the number of vouchers directly benefitting Pascagoula residents.

Six Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) properties, which provide a total of 589 federally-assisted housing units, also are located in the city.

Actions planned during the next year to address the needs to public housing

There are no plans at the present time to rehabilitate any of the public housing complexes in the City of Pascagoula. The City will continue to support the Resident Councils at all three public housing complexes and will continue to provide residents with technical assistance regarding Section 3 training and employment opportunities. The City also will continue to provide fair housing and predatory lending educational outreach information to public housing residents.

Actions to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

All three public housing complexes in the City have active Resident Councils. The City will continue to support efforts of the Mississippi Regional Housing Authority VIII to encourage public housing residents to be more involved in management and to participate in homeownership.

AP-65 Homeless and Other Special Needs Activities – 91.220(i)

Introduction

The City's direct investment in affordable housing and associated services for vulnerable citizens led to six homeless households (eight individuals) moving from homelessness to housing in 2015. Federal funding for local programs administered by local nonprofit agencies assisted in an additional six extremely low-income homeless households successfully maintaining housing, according to the Open Doors Homeless Coalition, which manages regional homeless data by city.

During Program Year 2016, the City will continue to work with regional and local nonprofit agencies to address homelessness in Pascagoula. Public service activities to support emergency and transitional housing and related services will be funded with a portion of Pascagoula's 2016 CDBG allocation as identified in AP-35 Projects.

Describe the jurisdictions one-year goals and actions for reducing and ending homelessness including reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

Nonprofit organizations have coordinated services to effectively end homelessness among veterans in the Mississippi Gulf Coast Continuum of Care that includes the City of Pascagoula. Under the leadership of the Open Doors Homeless Coalition, Pascagoula and other partners will continue to collaborate to effectively end chronic homelessness in the City by the end of 2017 and effectively end homelessness among families and youth by 2020.

Other partners in this effort include the Salvation Army, the South Mississippi AIDS Task Force, Homes of Grace, and the Gulf Coast Center for NonViolence, Church on the Rock, Power Ministries, Jackson County Community Action Agency and Catholic Social Services. These partners provide a range of services that include emergency housing, transitional housing and permanent housing.

In spite of this collaborative effort, there is a gap in available funding to support effective outreach and coordinated entry, which would streamline access to homeless services for Pascagoula's most vulnerable citizens.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

In 2016, there are 34 shelter beds in the City of Pascagoula primarily for single adults. The existing shelter would be more effective, according to homeless service providers, if renovated to include space for families with children needing shelter.

Through the CDBG public service category, the City of Pascagoula provides funding to experienced

homeless and special needs population service organizations that provide emergency shelters and transitional housing for individuals and their families. Once homeless or special needs populations are housed, supportive service providers work to address physical and mental needs, such as food and clothing.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City will continue to seek additional resources to meet the housing needs of homeless persons, especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth.

The City also will continue to support the efforts of homeless service providers to help homeless individuals and their families maintain housing, employment, mental, and physical health. Pascagoula will continue to be an active partner with the Open Doors Homeless Coalition in its efforts to obtain and maintain data to document the extent of homelessness in the City of Pascagoula.

The City will continue its public educational outreach to homeless and special needs populations regarding fair housing, and predatory lending.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

The City will continue to support efforts of housing and supportive service providers to obtain federal and state funding for the continuation and expansion of services and facilities to bridge the gap that exists in fully addressing the needs of the homeless and to prevent homelessness.

To help low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families who are likely to become homeless after being discharged from a publicly funded institution or system of care, or who are receiving assistance from public and private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education or youth needs, the City of Pascagoula will continue to support nonprofit agencies' applications for funding to continue and expand programs and facilities to meet the needs of these vulnerable populations. Agencies such as the South

Mississippi AIDS Task Force, South Mississippi Regional Center, LIFE, Gulf Coast Mental Health and the Mental Health Association of Mississippi will continue to be supported.

Discussion

By working collaboratively with regional and local nonprofit agencies and organizations, the City of Pascagoula maximizes the effective and efficient use of its limited CDBG resources to address the needs of the homeless.

Introduction

Pascagoula's 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan and 2015 Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice identify the need for additional federal funding to support development of affordable housing located in various neighborhoods throughout the City rather than clustering it in low-income and racially concentrated areas. The Comprehensive Neighborhood Revitalization Strategy to be funded with 2016 CDBG resources will improve the capacity of City staff to fund, coordinate and implement a diverse housing program that addresses the needs of tenants and homeowners to access and maintain affordable housing in a location of their choice.

The City will continue to implement its fair housing and predatory lending public education outreach efforts and will support grant applications of local nonprofit agencies to access:

- local housing rehabilitation loan, grant and tax credit programs;
- emergency shelter and transitional housing services and programs; and
- various programs to expand homebuyer education programs; to assist first-time homebuyers with down payment assistance; and to provide funding assistance for rental rehabilitation.

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

The City is committed to implementing the following policies as a way of ensuring there are no public policy barriers to affordable housing in Pascagoula:

- The City will continue to support the Mississippi Development Authority and the Mississippi HOME Corporation in the mission to provide residents with down payment assistance and homebuyer education.
- The City will work with developers to build affordable workforce development housing units.
- The City will continue to support efforts of the Mississippi Regional Housing Authority VIII to improve the three public housing complexes located in the City.
- The City will continue to support nonprofit agencies and organizations which provide weatherization and LIHEAP support to Pascagoula residents.
- The City will continue to take actions to eliminate the impediments identified in its 2015 Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice and will maintain records documenting actions taken.

Introduction

To meet other housing and nonhousing community development needs identified during development of the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan and the 2016 Action Plan, the City budgeted \$26,000 of its 2016 CDBG allocation for public services. Each of the following four nonprofit organizations will receive \$6,500 to support the following public service activities.

- Gulf Coast Center for Nonviolence will assist homeless persons, specifically individuals experiencing domestic violence, through emergency housing and related services;
- Open Doors Homeless Coalition will assist homeless persons through emergency housing services;
- Rock Community Outreach will help prevent homelessness by assisting low- to moderate-income persons with rental and utility assistance; and

Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

The City will continue to invest CDBG public service funds to support experienced nonprofit agencies in moving homeless individuals and their families from shelters to transitional and permanent housing. The City will continue to work with local and regional housing agencies to pursue a comprehensive array of residential loan, grant and tax credit resources as part of its comprehensive efforts to meet the affordable housing needs of Pascagoula residents.

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

During the 2016 Program Year, the City will continue to work with the Mississippi Regional Housing Authority VIII and other housing providers in the City to reduce lead-based paint hazards in housing

units.

- The City will continue to require that substantial rehabilitation of housing units in the City, particularly if CDBG funds are invested in the project, test for lead-based paint and abate it, if necessary, in compliance with EPA regulations.
- The Mississippi Regional Housing Authority VIII will continue its home inspection program requiring owners of housing units inspected for Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program eligibility scrape and repaint any surface areas where paint is chipping or peeling.
- The Housing Authority also will continue its lead-based paint hazard educational program by providing educational information to Section 8 families with children aged 6 years and younger living in public housing.

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

The City of Pascagoula has the following programs and policies in place to reduce the number of poverty-level families:

- The City will continue to invest CDBG resources to revitalize, rebuild and redevelop deteriorating neighborhoods where property is not being consistently maintained in compliance with local codes, and especially in neighborhoods where a majority of residents are low- to moderate-income.
- The City will pro-actively promote and encourage economic development and redevelopment in areas throughout the City.
- The City will continue to recruit new businesses and support expanded job opportunities for residents.
- The City will continue to work with housing developers to expand and diversify local affordable housing options.
- The City will maintain public street improvements (such as curbs, gutters and sidewalks) in accordance with its infrastructure maintenance policy.
- The City will support efforts to expand affordable child care services (both day care and after hour care) to allow parents of young children to maintain employment.
- The City will continue to support efforts to expand public transportation services to improve residents' access to employment, education and training opportunities.

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

Below are strategies to develop Pascagoula's institutional structure identified in its 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan, which the City will continue to use and build upon:

- Improve coordination and communication between public and private sector agencies to avoid

duplication of efforts;

- Support efforts by the Mississippi Regional Housing Authority VIII and other housing organizations to expand the inventory of affordable housing for the elderly through HUD Programs and other public/private resources.
- Continue to support the efforts of the Salvation Army, South Mississippi AIDS Task Force, Homes of Grace, Open Doors Homeless Coalition, Gulf Coast Center for NonViolence, Boys and Girls Clubs, Public Housing Resident Councils, Stevens Center and others in their work to address the unmet needs of the homeless, the elderly, the physically and mentally disabled, persons with HIV/AIDS and their families, and the drug and alcohol addicted individuals who live in the City of Pascagoula.
- Support efforts to meet the public transportation needs of Pascagoula residents, especially of residents who are unable to access social services critical to their overall health and wellbeing.
- Continue to support on-going efforts of local and regional housing and service agencies to address the full continuum of care for Pascagoula residents.
- Continue to adhere to its Citizen Participation Plan so that the City may benefit from diverse input that fully reflects the opinions of its residents so local needs may be identified comprehensively and appropriately prioritized.
- Continue to conduct an annual mailout to local and regional housing and community service agencies to encourage participation in developing and implementing Pascagoula's Consolidated and Annual Action Plans.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

The City has significantly increased its efforts to coordinate development of a regional housing and community services collaborative that will coordinate the work of both local and regional social service agencies. The City recognizes that improved service coordination will help eliminate duplication of efforts, maximize the effective use of limited public resources, improve communication and education about "best practices", and identify community-wide solutions to meet basic housing and community needs.

The City will continue to participate as an active member in the Open Doors Homeless Coalition Continuum of Care and to adhere to its Citizen Participation Plan.

I am pleased to inform you of your jurisdiction’s Fiscal Year (FY) 2016 allocations for the Office of Community Planning and Development’s (CPD) formula programs, which provide funding for housing, community and economic development activities, and assistance for low and moderate-income persons and special populations across the country. President Obama signed Public Law 114-113 on December 18, 2015, which includes FY 2016 funding for these programs. Your jurisdiction’s FY 2016 available amounts are:

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)	\$179,527
HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME)	\$ 0
Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA)	\$ 0
Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG)	\$ 0

This letter highlights several important points related to these programs. First, Secretary Julián Castro is committed to making HUD the “Department of Opportunity” and has established a number of initiatives intended to achieve that goal. In 2015, we celebrated the 50th anniversary of the Department’s establishment, and these initiatives build on HUD’s mission to promote homeownership, support community development, and increase access to affordable housing free from discrimination. The Department is working hard with grantees on these key goals and urges you to review the entire plan at: <http://portal.hud.gov/hudportal/HUD?src=/hudvision>. In an era when the nation’s severe shortage of affordable rental housing creates substantial housing instability—contributing to homelessness, family mobility and unequal educational attainment—I am particularly interested in working with grantees to increase affordable housing production through our CPD formula programs.

Second, HUD recommends that grantees effectively plan and implement programs that leverage these critical Federal financial resources to achieve the greatest possible return for the communities and individuals they are intended to assist.

- HUD urges grantees to consider using CDBG funds, to the extent possible, to support investments in predevelopment activities for infrastructure and public facilities activities that can provide multiple benefits for communities.
- HUD has created a Renewable Energy Toolkit specifically tailored to CPD grantees. To the extent that grantees are interested in using funds for renewable energy projects, please feel free to access that toolkit online at www.hudexchange.info.
- If you would like assistance from CPD in redesigning, prioritizing or targeting your programs,

either you or the head of the agency that administers your program may request assistance through your local CPD Director.

Third, CPD is asking grantees to renew their focus on administration and management of these programs as part of an effort to ensure effective use of the funds. Throughout 2016, CPD and HUD's Office of the Inspector General expect to issue a range of guidance that will highlight particular areas where grantees commonly stumble. I urge grantees to actively review their policies and procedures governing these programs and to strengthen management practices, particularly with regard to recordkeeping, in order to avoid problems and risk this vital funding. This focus on administration is particularly critical because the Integrated Disbursement and Information System (IDIS), which is HUD's financial and data system for managing these formula programs, will no longer commit and disburse grant funds on a first-in first-out (FIFO) basis beginning with the FY 2015 grants. All FY 2015 and future grants will be committed and disbursed on a grant specific basis.

The Office of Community Planning and Development is looking forward to working with you to promote simple steps that will enhance the viability and performance of these critical programs and successfully meet the challenges that our communities face. SeaWorld will stop breeding orcas, making them perform

ORLANDO, Fla. — After years of pressure, SeaWorld made a surprise announcement on Thursday: It no longer breeds killer whales in captivity and will soon stop making them leap from their pools or splash audiences on command.

Surrendering finally to a profound shift in how people feel about using animals for entertainment, the SeaWorld theme parks have joined a growing list of industries dropping live animal tricks. Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus is retiring all of its touring elephants in May. Once-popular animal shows in Las Vegas have virtually disappeared.

"Society's attitude toward these very, very large, majestic animals under human care has shifted for a variety of reasons, whether it's a film, legislation, people's comments on the Internet," said SeaWorld Entertainment CEO Joel Manby. "It wasn't worth fighting that. We needed to move where society was moving."

SeaWorld's 29 killer whales will remain in captivity, but in "new, inspiring natural orca encounters," according to the company. SeaWorld's orcas range in age from 1 to 51 years old, so some could remain on display for decades.

Attendance at SeaWorld's parks declined after the 2013 release of "Blackfish," a highly critical documentary. Some top musical acts dropped out of SeaWorld-sponsored concerts at the urging of animal rights activists, who kept up a visible presence demonstrating outside the parks' gates.

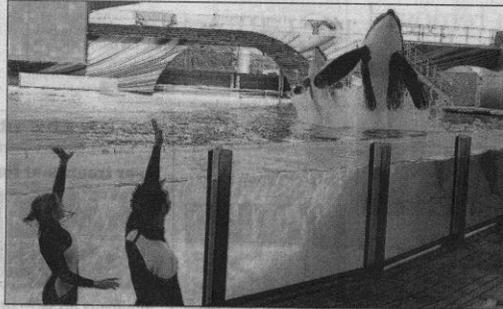
Still, the decision shocked advocates who have spent decades campaigning against keeping marine mammals captive, and it represents a sharp U-turn from SeaWorld's previous reaction to the documentary.

Years of change

In August 2014, SeaWorld announced major new investments in the orca program, including new, larger tanks, first in San Diego and then at its parks in Orlando and San Antonio, Texas.

But the California Coastal Commission didn't approve the \$100 million expansion until last October, and when it did, it banned orca breeding as part of the decision. SeaWorld sued, arguing that the commission overstepped its authority, but said it would end its San Diego orca shows by 2017.

Meanwhile, SeaWorld brought in a new leader with more experience in regional theme parks than zoos and aquariums, which have been fending off such protests for decades. Manby was hired as SeaWorld CEO last March 19 after running

Dollywood and other musically-themed parks. He said Thursday that he brought a "fresh perspective" to the killer whale quandary, and soon realized that "society is shifting here."

Orcas have been a centerpiece of the SeaWorld parks since shows at the Shamu stadium in San Diego became the main draw in the 1970s. But criticism has steadily increased in the decades since

and then became sharper after an orca named Tiliikum battered and drowned trainer Dawn Brancheau after a "Dine with Shamu" show in Orlando in 2010.

Her death was highlighted in "Blackfish," and it wasn't the first for Tiliikum. The whale also killed an animal trainer and a trespasser in the 1990s.

"Blackfish" director Gabriela Cowperthwaite said

she applauds SeaWorld's decision, "but mostly I applaud the public for recalibrating

how they feel ethically about orcas in captivity."

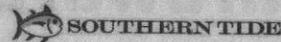
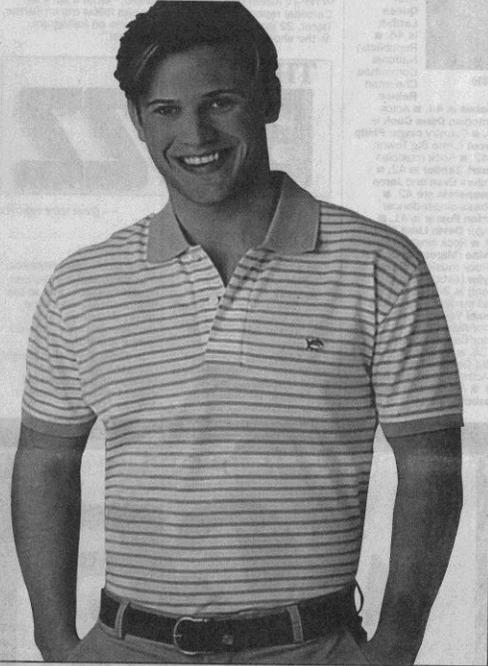
More than just orcas

The new orca shows will begin next year at the San Diego park before expanding to its San Antonio park and then to Orlando in 2019.

Manby said. "What about shows involving dolphins and other marine mammals?"

"Stay tuned on that," Manby said. "A lot of people don't understand how hard it is internally to make these kinds of decisions. We need to execute this well."

Hancock High drag queen triumphs at womanless beauty pageant

HANCOCK COUNTY — Her son was still putting on his makeup as she prepared to walk out the door. His custom-made dress — embellished with gold and emerald stones — was tossed across his bed as he stood under the harsh light in his bathroom, still in plaid pajamas, painting a dark layer of blush across his cheekbones. Mary Ladner could not wait any longer, or she'd be late for work. "When you get your face done, send me pictures," she said, truck keys in hand. "I hate not being here."

Trevor Ladner, 18, began experimenting with drag when he was a sophomore. His persona, Miss Annie Thang, made her first appearance in front of his school Feb. 26 at its womanless beauty pageant.

The fundraiser calls for male students to dress up in women's clothing and choose a talent to perform. The audience's cheers decide the winner.

"It's basically what I do every weekend as a drag queen," he said.

He said he wanted Miss Annie Thang to show his classmates a different form of art and to be "a trailblazer for the queer community."

"I think that's really, really important because so many queer (LGBT) kids feel like they can't be successful."

He draws new eyebrows, applies eye shadow and false lashes and picks a lipstick color.

And that's just the makeup. Ladner sews many of Annie Thang's outfits. But the dress for the pageant, a fitted green gown with a mermaid flair of tulle, he bought to fit like a glove. The gold, peep-toe shoes had needed some pizzazz, so he added green stones to the heel and top strap the week of the pageant.

His best friend, Hancock High valedictorian Grant Cullom, left his Diamond-

her son's Christmas wish list. He got his gift as Trenton opened his new hunting bow.

"My brother is definitely one of my biggest supporters," Trevor Ladner said. "I knew once I decided that I wanted to do the womanless beauty pageant at the end of last year that I wanted my brother to escort me."

He asked him to be his escort the day he came out to his brother.

"He's always been there, by my side, supporting me and rallying for me. He's my biggest fan, and he al-

ways. I knew it was so important for me to be honest with my classmates so they would know it's OK to be honest with people."

As he waited backstage, his brother helped adjust his dress straps and joked around with his friends who were contestants.

As the announcer called Miss Annie Thang's name, the brothers walked on-stage. Trenton Ladner could

not keep his eyes off his brother during his performance.

When Trevor Ladner heard his classmates' cheers his nerves dissipated, he said. He beat out four others for the crown.

"Everyone chanted my name when I won," he said, "and it was just really amazing. I knew that I had to do it but I didn't know that I would get that great of a response from it."

He hopes Miss Annie Thang's performance opens conversation about Hancock High's LGBT student base.

"I wanted to show people that you could do this and it not be a joke, that it is not a mockery," he said.

"I hope it made an impact on other people at my school and they continue to be more open and accepting of themselves and of others."

Hood, Reeves might lead governor's race

JACKSON — The closing weeks of June have brought the first previews of what could be Mississippi's 2019 race for governor — Jim Hood versus Tate Reeves.

At this time last year, Phil Bryant was cruising toward re-election, while truck driver Robert Gray was still six weeks from shocking the world by winning the Democratic primary without even voting for himself. Bryant, of course, demolished Gray in the general election.

So maybe it seems too soon to be talking about 2019. But work began to trickle out following the Democrats' annual Jefferson-Jackson-Hamer dinner in May that the attorney general, the last heavyweight Democratic politician in Mississippi, was finally going to take a shot at the governor's mansion. And Hood's

budget for the 2017 year, which begins July 1. But Hood issued legal opinions that say \$72 million of that money is legally classified as trust funds, meaning an agency is just holding it for someone else. Hood said lawmakers could come back and amend the individual trust fund laws to legally take the money, but barring such a move, he says they can't lay hands on it.

Reeves' calling card, since winning election as state treasurer before turning 30, has been skill as a money manager. The current budget problems cut against that strength. Bolstered by a recovery in state revenues following the 2009 recession, Republican leaders have often boasted that they had stopped spending one-time money. But the budget that ends Thursday has been pasted together using lawsuit settlements that Hood won and state savings, and even then will likely end tens of millions short.

Then lawmakers tried to sweep \$187 million that had been in special ac-

counting into the midst of the state's budget difficulties — bear that out. Talking to reporters last week, Hood expressed opposition to corporate tax cuts and called for more spending on roads and bridges, subjects pretty far afield from the usual public utterances of the Chickasaw County prosecutor.

"If they go on and sweep it, we may have to go in and challenge that authority," Hood said, abruptly threatening a lawsuit.

The overall budget gap is wider than \$72 million. There's also a \$56 million miscalculation adding to the 2017 shortfall, Medicaid and some other mandatory expenses are underfunded, and it's unclear how the messy end to 2016's budget might ripple into 2017. Lawmakers could easily be looking at \$250 million deficit in 2017 if revenue collections don't improve

Hood's blaming the gap on \$350 million in corporate tax relief given by lawmakers from 2012 to 2015, saying lawmakers grabbed the special fund money to cover up what they'd done.

Reeves doubled down on tax cuts, pushing a \$415 million, multiyear tax reduction through the Legislature that includes eliminating Mississippi's \$260-million-a-year corporate franchise tax.

When someone else challenges Reeves, he tends to strike back, both verbally and in legislation. He seemed to recognize Hood as a threat last week, when he hurled the biggest insult a Mississippi Republican could hurl at a Democrat — linking him to President Barack Obama. Reeves also accused Hood of issuing a self-serving legal opinion to hold onto trust funds not controlled by his office.

"Obama's attorney general in Mississippi takes the same approach that Obama's attorney general in Washington takes: ignore the law if it doesn't meet your political views," Reeves said in a statement. The Commercial Appeal reported Saturday that District Attorney John Champion says the July 5 hearing will be delayed over a scheduling conflict. Champion said lawyers for Quinton Tellis could not make the date. He did

not have a new date for the hearing.

A grand jury charged Tellis with the death in February. That ended a lengthy investigation into the grisly killing.

Tellis was being held in Louisiana at the time of the indictment. He pleaded guilty in May there to unauthorized use of a debit card which belonged to a slain Louisiana woman. Tellis was not charged in her death.

He was extradited to Mississippi on Thursday.

4 more sentenced over prison riot

Four more men have been sentenced for roles in a deadly 2012 riot at a Mississippi immigration detention facility.

U.S. District Judge David Bramlette III sentenced the Mexican man to federal prison Thursday.

Hector Miguel Diaz-Osuna, 35, was sentenced to 25 years. A jury found him guilty of rioting and causing a correctional officer's death at the Adams County Correctional Center, operated by Corrections Corporation of

America.

Three others pleaded guilty to rioting. Joel Oswaldo Ramirez-Nunez, 36, was sentenced to seven years and eight months; Ruben Coronado-Licon, 24, was sentenced to five-and-a-half years; and Jorge Felix-Ibarra, 31, was sentenced to four years and nine months.

At least 16 men have been convicted. The defendants have jointly been ordered to pay \$1.38 million in restitution and will be deported after release.

2016 CDBG Action Plan Public Hearing Minutes 5:30 p.m., Monday, June 20, 2016

The City of Pascagoula conducted a public hearing in the Council Chambers of City Hall at 5:30 p.m. on Monday, June 20, 2016 to present information about development of the 2016 One-Year Action Plan for its CDBG Entitlement Program and to provide citizens with an opportunity to ask questions and comment orally and in writing about the community's unmet housing and non-housing community development needs and priorities. A copy of the sign-in sheet, agenda and handouts distributed at the hearing follow these minutes.

Grace Aaron, consultant for the City of Pascagoula, opened the hearing by introducing herself and Aleta Raley, with the Pascagoula Department of Community and Economic Development. Mrs. Raley explained that a family emergency prevented Jen Dearman, Director, from attending the hearing as planned. They welcomed those present, asked that each person sign the sign-in sheet and distributed the agenda and handouts.

Ms Aaron presented an overview of the HUD-funded CDBG Program, referring to the Fact Sheet handout as she identified the national objectives, provided examples of eligible activities and indicated where more detailed CDBG Program information, including the Citizen Participation Plan, is available for public review at the City. She explained the purpose of the One-Year CDBG Action Plan in context of Pascagoula's 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan and called attention to the development schedule summary on page 3 of the handout.

The Program Year 2016 CDBG allocation, carry over of previous years' funds and proposed activity expenses were then reviewed by Ms Aaron and also are detailed on page 3 of the handout. Ms Aaron stated that the draft 2016 Action Plan will be available for a 30-day public review period, beginning June 27 and ending July 29, at the locations listed in the handout. She encouraged those present to provide oral and written input about the City's proposed use of 2016 CDBG funds, the Draft Action Plan and unmet housing and non-housing community development needs and priorities of the community.

During the presentation of the CDBG Entitlement Program and 2016 Action Plan information, questions were asked and answered about HUD's annual 15% cap on public service activities; what national objectives are being met by the activities proposed to be funded through the PY2016 allocation; the purpose of the Comprehensive Housing Strategy; the Singing River Health System public service to be provided; the Emergency Shelter Grant Program; and whether the City of Pascagoula is using any CDBG funds for residential slab removal.

Following the presentation, Ms Aaron invited those present to ask additional questions and provide input. The following comments were made:

- The annual 15% cap on public service activities is restrictive and low considering the needs of the community.
- There don't seem to be enough HUD funds made available to achieve national objectives or local goals.

- The City should build another park or expand funding for ADA improvements instead of implementing the commercial sign removal matching grant program with CDBG funds.
- Public services should not be provided to nonlegal residents, especially food services.
- There is need for a public healthcare clinic in Pascagoula and Coastal Family Health is interested in working with the City to develop one; they have operating funds, but need an appropriate facility.
- Code violations need to be addressed by the City so that the burden of compliance is on private property owners rather than the public; public funds shouldn't be used to improve private property.
- The community needs improved access to affordable housing through assistance for first month's rent and security and utility deposits.
- The proposed mural activity to stimulate neighborhood revitalization and improve residents' living environment makes more sense than the proposed sign program.
- The Singing River Health System is a steward of grant funds, maximizing benefits to help people. The community has real needs other than aesthetic issues.
- Rehabilitation of existing housing stock is needed, both owner-occupied and rental property.

Mrs. Raley indicated that public input provided orally and in writing really helps the City identify priorities for use of the limited CDBG funds each year. Ms Aaron encouraged those present to provide additional comments in writing to the City during the 30-day comment period. She indicated that input provided during the public hearing will be considered by the City as it prepares the Final 2016 Action Plan; the minutes will summarize comments made at the public hearing and also will be included in the Action Plan.

There being no further questions or comments, the hearing was closed at approximately 6:20 p.m.

Summary

The 2016 One-Year Action Plan is a requirement of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) that is designed to develop a coordinated and cooperative effort to identify and address housing, community development and supportive housing needs of the City of Pascagoula. The One-Year Action Plan is based on prioritized needs and strategies for meeting those needs identified in the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan.

Both the Action Plan and Consolidated Plan are designed by HUD to consolidate the planning and application requirements for four HUD Community Planning and Development formula grant programs:

1. The Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG)
2. Home Investment Partnerships (HOME)
3. Housing Opportunities for People With AIDS (HOPWA)
4. Emergency Shelter Grants (ESG)

The three broad goals of the four HUD Community Planning and Development programs are:

1. To provide decent housing;
2. To provide a suitable living environment; and
3. To expand economic opportunities.

Pascagoula is not an entitlement city and does not receive an annual allocation of funds under the HOPWA, ESG or HOME programs but must work with other agencies to compete for funding from the programs.

However, **Pascagoula is an entitlement city under the rules of HUD's CDBG Program** and receives an annual allocation of CDBG funding, which in Program Year 2016 is \$179,527. During 2016, the City does not anticipate generating any program income, but currently has unallocated CDBG resources in the amount of \$20,575.

National Objectives of Community Development Block Grant Program

The CDBG Program has three national objectives and CDBG-funded projects or activities must meet at least one of the objectives for use of these federal funds:

1. Principally benefit low- and moderate-income persons;
2. Prevent or eliminate slums or blight; and
3. Meet a need having a particular urgency.

Availability of Information

Information concerning the Action Plan, the Consolidated Plan and the Community Development Block Grant Program is available for public review at the Pascagoula Department of Community and Economic Development, located at 630 Delmas Avenue, between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Examples of Basic Eligible Activities for the CDBG Program

1. Acquisition of property for a public purpose
2. Public facilities and improvements including streets, curbs, sidewalks, water and wastewater improvements
3. Urgent needs and emergency grants to address community development needs having a particular urgency because existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community.
4. Interim assistance requiring immediate action such as street improvements and to alleviate emergency conditions
5. Relocation payment and assistance for permanently or temporarily displaced individuals, families, businesses and organizations, and reimbursement for loss of rental income incurred in holding housing units to be utilized by relocation of individuals and families displaced by program activities
6. Public services including employment services, fair housing counseling, healthcare and substance abuse services, services for victims of domestic violence, the homeless and qualified elderly residents (this activity is capped by HUD at 15% of the annual allocation plus 15% of program income received during the prior program year)
7. Special economic development activities
8. Planning and administration (this activity is capped at 20% of the sum of the annual allocation plus the program income received during that program year)

Examples of Eligible Rehabilitation Activities for the CDBG Program

1. Publicly or privately owned commercial or industrial buildings, except that the rehabilitation of buildings owned by a private, for-profit business is limited to improvement to the exterior of the property
2. Publicly owned residential buildings and improvements

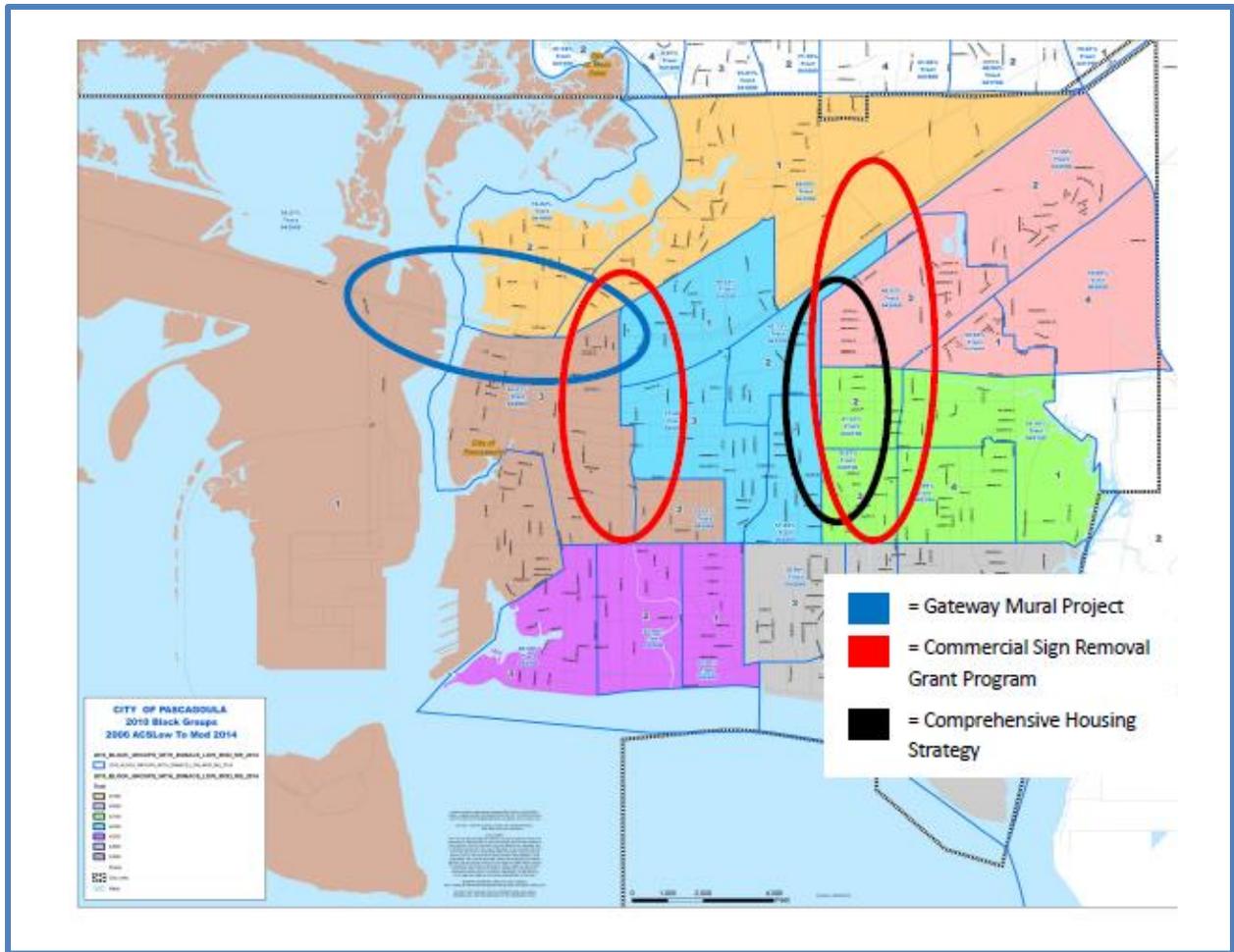

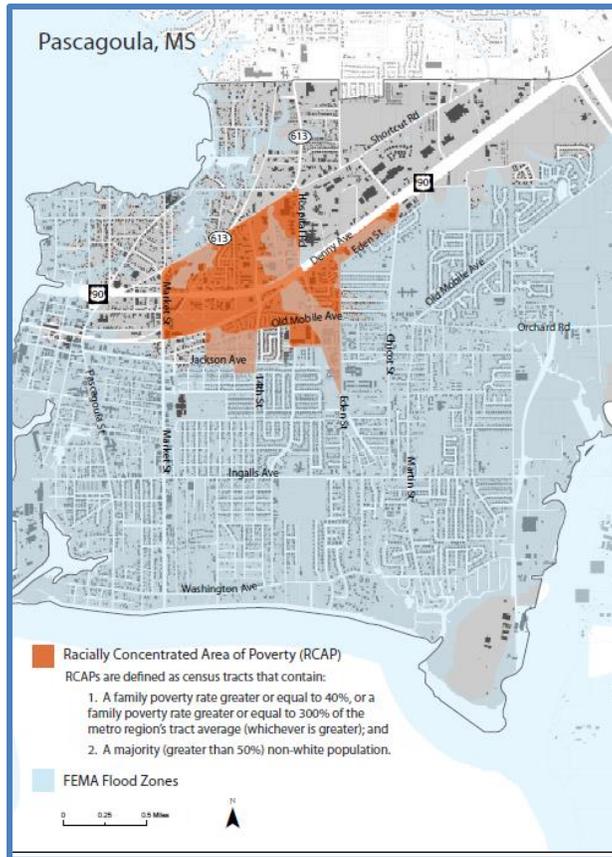
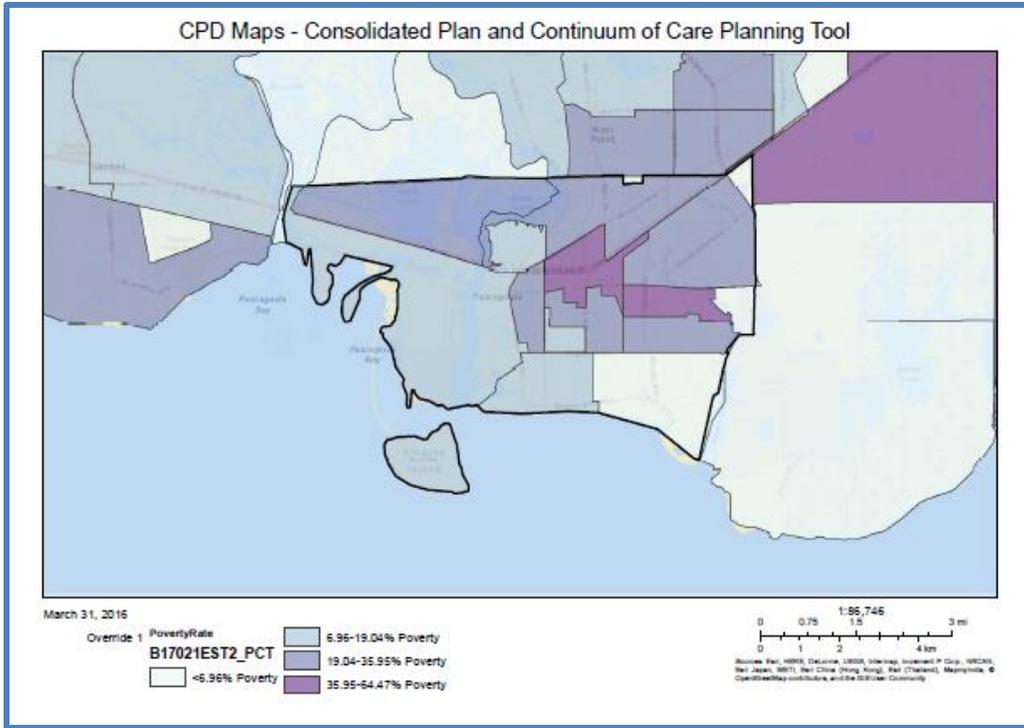

SECTION 1: There is hereby created a Recreation Commission in and for the City which shall consist of 13 members who are to be appointed by the City Council. Each member shall be a qualified elector of the City and shall not hold any other municipal office.

TO JACKSON COUNTY AND REMOVAL FROM
CITY OF PASCAGOULA INVENTORY**

WHEREAS, the City of Pascagoula has acquired a Go-Devil Surface Drive Boat bearing identification number ICN12535 and hull identification number GDVO2889G606; and

WHEREAS, the above referenced boat has been in the City's inventory for approximately 10 years and maintained as an asset of the Police Department; and

WHEREAS, due to its configuration and the manner in which the propulsion gear is mounted on the boat, the boat has proven to be of limited utility to the City and has ceased to be of any economic value for the operations of the Pascagoula Police Department, or the City of Pascagoula; and

WHEREAS, the City has received a formal request from Sheriff Mike Ezell of the Jackson County Sheriff's Department for the transfer of the boat to his agency, as reflected in the letter attached hereto as an exhibit; and

WHEREAS, in exchange for the transfer of the boat, the City will receive a utility trailer that can be used by the Police Department for the transport of motorcycles to be repaired and for other purposes during times of emergencies; and

WHEREAS, the relative values of the two assets are nearly equal given their present condition; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 31-7-13 (m)(vi) of the Mississippi Code, intergovernmental sales and transfers of assets are allowed notwithstanding the transfers may not be exactly equal in fair market value; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the need for the boat for use by our Police Department is minimal, while the utility trailer will greatly enhance the ability of the Police Department to transport motorcycles and other equipment for maintenance and repair purposes and during emergencies; and

WHEREAS, Jackson County has heretofore transferred the utility trailer to the Pascagoula Police Department for its use for such purposes and it would be beneficial for the City to transfer the above described boat to Jackson County for its use in rescue operations in shallow water areas throughout Jackson County:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PASCAGOULA AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The matters set forth in the foregoing preambles are hereby ratified and found to factual.

SECTION 2. The City Manager is authorized to transfer to Jackson County the Go-Devil Surface Drive Boat described in the first preamble to this resolution and any accessories needed for its operation.

SECTION 4. The afore-referenced utility trailer which has been received from Jackson County in exchange for the boat, shall be added to the inventory and an inventory tag issued therefor.

SECTION 5. The transfer of the boat and associated equipment needed for its operation, shall take place as soon as may conveniently be done upon the passage of this resolution.

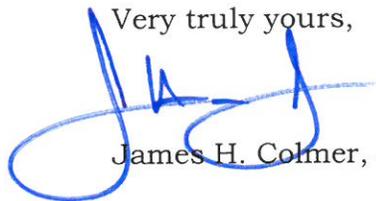

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Central Business District Residential Tax Exemption Information



2016

Pascagoula Central Business District Residential Tax Exemption:

Utilizing Miss. Code Ann. 27.31.31, the Pascagoula Central Business District (CBD) Residential Tax Exemption Policy was established to promote private investment and economic growth within the City of Pascagoula. The Exemption will allow for up to an 100% exemption of municipal ad valorem taxes (excluding School Taxes) for up to ten (10) years for residential developments including new structures and improvements to existing structures located within the CBD. The exemption is for the increase in City ad valorem taxes caused by the new construction or renovation of existing structures.

Residential Tax Exemption Facts:

- The tax exemption may be granted for up to 100% and may last up to ten (10) years.
- The residence must be located within the boundaries of the CBD. City staff can assist you in making this determination. See Exhibit A for a description of the CBD and map.
- The investment must be at least \$150,000. This includes cost of renovations or new construction.
- This Exemption can apply to a new residence or an existing residence. It includes remodeling or improving an existing residence or constructing a new residence. The tax exemption is transferrable. If during the exemption period, new ownership of the residence occurs, the terms of the original exemption will carry over to the new owner for the unexpended portion of the exemption period.
- If your residence is to be located in a historic district, additional steps may be required. These will be handled on a case-by-case basis.

How to Apply:

An application for residential tax exemption in the CBD is enclosed (Exhibit B). Complete this application **PRIOR** to beginning construction or renovation. After submitting a building permit application to the Planning and Building Department, tax exemption applications should be submitted to the Community and Economic Development Department.

The Residential Tax Exemption Policy is structured to provide the City Council complete discretion for approving each application up to 100% for up to ten years. The City strives to leverage this incentive to facilitate reconstruction and redevelopment that have been and continue to be affected by the current economic climate and high cost of insurance. In order to maximize the potential of this opportunity, the City staff will consider the criteria below when recommending the level and term of a tax exemption. The Director of Community and Economic Development as well as the Director of Planning and Building will evaluate applications. Based on these evaluations and discussion with the City's Economic Development Team, the Community and Economic Development Director will make the specific recommendation to City Council.

The following point system will be used in staff evaluations:

- Investment – 10 points
 - Value of project costs
 - Projected increased assessed value of finished product
- Community need for development – 10 points
 - Period of time the building or site has been vacant

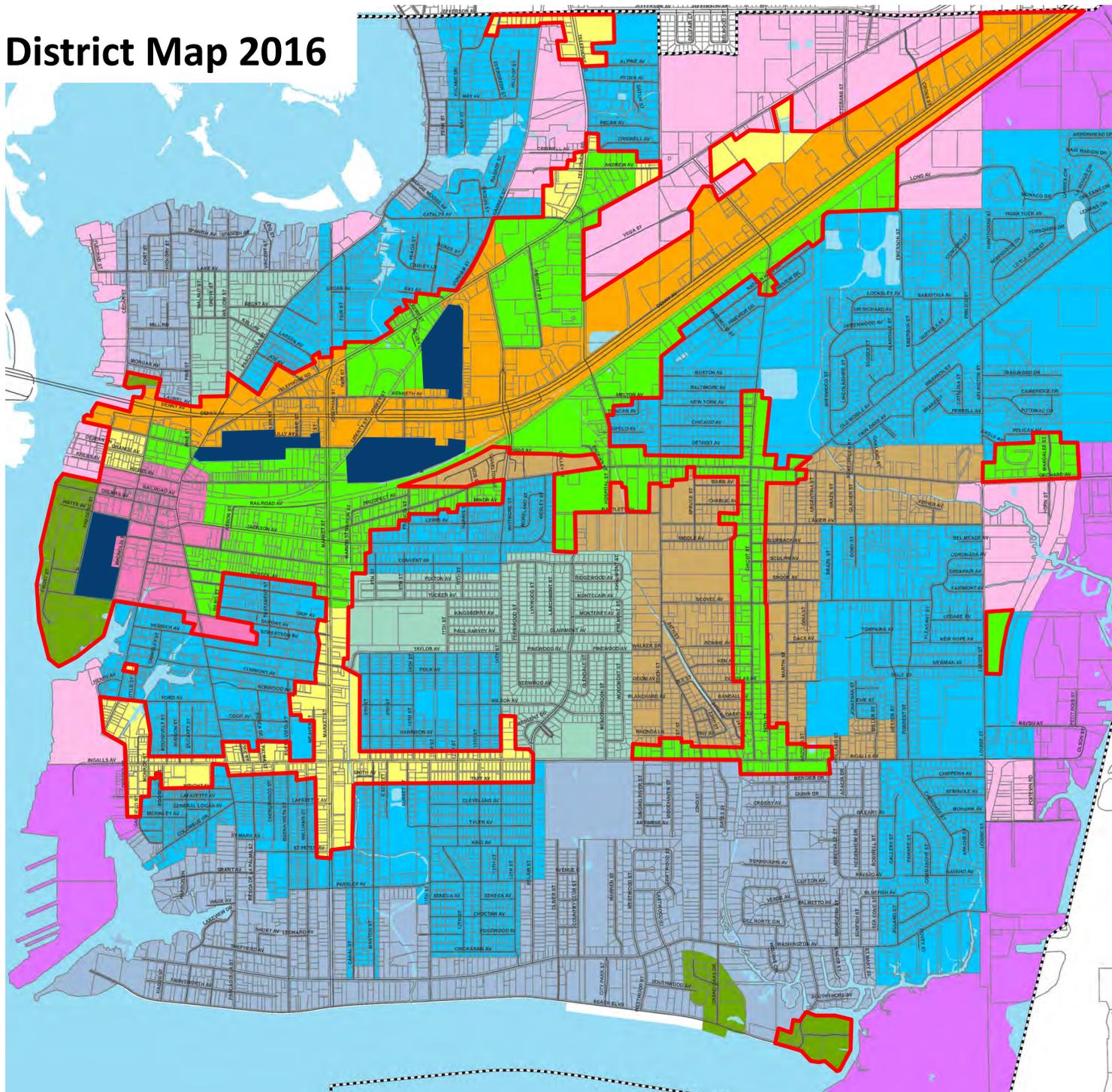
